Ascent 'Explore' Women' Bushwalking Shoes Review by member Meryl Hale

As a physio, I regularly recommend the Ascent brand of shoes, so I was more than happy to accept the offer to trial this new range of shoes designed for bushwalking women.

It would have been helpful if my correct size had been supplied, but I figured this could be overcome to some extent by wearing thick socks. Size-wise, I am normally a 7.5, & this would have been perfect, so that's handy to know.

Ascent are known for their well-contoured & properly supportive footbed without being rigid. These 'Explore' shoes deliver on this important point. They also have a comfortably wide toe-box and snug heel box.

The upper fabric seems pretty wear resistant & scrubs up easily after dusty Mallee walks. I'd love to be able to comment on these shoes' water-proof credentials, but short of dancing around the sprinkler in the front yard, that opportunity just hasn't arisen.

Maroon & black combine well to give a stylish shoe that suits both the work & leisure environment. I found the flat, nylon laces a bit slippery, needing double bows to keep them secure. This could be easily remedied.

My vote is still out on the grippiness of the sole. The tread is definite without being chunky and tractor-like, and performed well enough on dry Grampians rocks. I'll add a postscript comment on the sole once it's rained.

I felt a little exposed in a shoe, rather than a boot for bushwalking. And while I like the 'Explore' shoe, I would still choose a boot for extended walks or challenging terrain.

Overall, I think this is an attractive well-made walking shoe, that will really suit those who like to meet the bush from well-formed tracks & it is suitable for a good range of terrain. Ascent's great footbed remains a winner for the 'Explore' shoe. Give them a try - I think you'll like them.

In Mildura, Ascent footwear is available through Athlete's Foot @ Centro. I've been told the 'Explore' shoes will retail for approximately \$170. Not sure when they will be available.

CONSIDERATIONS FOR BWV AFFILIATED CLUBS

BWV affiliated clubs are separate legal entities. As such they are advised to develop and implement Child Safety Policies and Procedures that are specific to their club needs.

4 Working with Children Checks (WWCC)

Where trip and activity leaders have direct contact with children during activities that are directed at children or open

to families, clubs must ensure leaders have a current Working with Children Check. This is irrespective of the presence of parents/guardians on the activity concerned.

This includes assistant leaders if they are present. For walks directed at adults, a Working with Children Check for leaders is not required, however, if there is a possibility that children may be present then the need for a Working with Children Check should be determined by the Walks Coordinator based on assessed risk.

How to apply for a WWCC

As community groups it is important for bushwalking clubs to be known and seen as child - friendly and compliant with current laws. It will be an asset to a club if all leaders have current Working with Children Checks (WWCC). It is a simple, free and quick process that can be done at a local post office or online. A WWCC is valid for 4 years. Reporting RoseMarie_23762-Clubs should have a process in place where any child safety incidents can be reported and have a clear policy on how incidents will be handled once reported.


Risk Assessment

In a general sense, with an increased focus on encouraging family walks, Trip Risk Assessment forms may also need to be adjusted to reflect what parents must agree to when going on a family walk and that they acknowledge that they have been advised on what to wear, what to bring, sunscreen, hats, first aid, emergency procedures (e.g. a child gets lost), inappropriate/unruly behaviour, special needs children, walk hazards, etc.
